LOCATION:	Montreal, Quebec - Participatory Cultures Lab, 930 – 2001 McGill College Hybrid: The intern is expected to work at the host organization's office for a designated number of days with the possibility to work remotely, as determined by the organization.
DESCRIPTION OF HOST ORGANIZATION:	The Participatory Cultures Lab (PCL) was established in 2010 by Dr. Claudia Mitchell in the Department of Integrated Studies in Education at McGill University. The PCL is organized around the study and use of visual and participatory approaches to research and social action and involves the work of collaborators and research students engaged in the study of participatory research. Central to the interests of the team, this work includes the study and use of such visual tools such as digital storytelling, photovoice, participatory video, participatory archiving, cellphilms, objects and things, collage, and other arts-based approaches in the process of collecting, analyzing, and working with research data. It also links to memory work, self-study and to various autoethnographic approaches to research. The work links to issues of social justice, focusing on such areas as youth agency, sexuality and HIV and AIDS, gender-based violence, food security, and poverty alleviation.

TRANSFORM is a 6 year transnational project funded through SSHRC's Partnership Grant program focusing on participatory visual approaches (cellphilming, photovoice, drawing, textiles, performance) tdORsshe (he (nd)-13 (S)0.6 (
